- The following are True/False:
  1. A Universal Turing Machine can compute anything that any other Turing Machine could possibly compute. **T**
  2. The undecidability of the halting problem is a statement about Turing machines: it is not applicable to real computers. **F**
  3. The Turing machine is a universal model of computation: with a Turing machine we can solve any decision problem that can be solved with a DFA or with a Pentium M running Linux. **T**
  4. Because the Halting Problem is unsolvable, it is impossible to tell if your TSP program for your assignment has an infinite loop. **F**
  5. If P equals NP, then the Traveling Salesperson Problem can be solved in polynomial time by a deterministic Turing Machine. **T**
  6. If P does not equal NP, then there is no case of the Traveling Salesperson Problem for which you can find the optimal tour in polynomial time. **F**
